SPANISH

In the Spanish class we learn through songs stories, performance, games and movement.

SPANISH / VISUAL ARTS

Visual Arts and Spanish are taught together. The program follows the Content and Language Integrated Learning model (CLIL).

The focus of such a pedagogical model is to deliver learning outcomes for all students in both Content/Art and Language/Spanish by providing a

meaningful context for purposeful language learning.



Students will have one fifty minute session per week.









Throughout the year students are introduced to the Spanish vocabulary for colours, the materials and actions in the art room. They learn to introduce themselves and express their emotions with others.



PREP MUSIC PROGRAM

All prep students attend 1x 50 minute music session per week.

John Carr will teach Prep Kenji and Prep Trina and Simon Lewis will teach Prep Vicky and Prep Terri/Ellie.

During music lessons, students will engage in a wide variety of musical activities aimed at developing creativity and a love of music and movement.

Students will:

- . Sing to communicate their experiences and ideas.
- · Develop skills to help them sing in tune.
- Use un-tuned percussion instruments to play the beat and create simple rhythmic patterns.
- · Listen to and discuss different genres of music.
- Identify what they enjoy about music they have listened to and why.

The highlight of 2025 will be the whole school musical production in term 3, giving students to opportunity to perform onstage under lights at the Darebin Arts and Entertainment Centre. Details will be announced later in the year.



A CHANCE TO BE PHYSICALLY ACTIVE, CHALLENGED, AND TO HAVE FUN!

Activities that incorporate *fundamental movement skills* – movements that use different body parts including feet, legs, trunk, head, arms, and hands.

Focus on values - including cooperation, following rules, taking turns, and displaying sportsmanship.

Identify and describe different emotions we may feel while participating in PE.

Describe how our *body responds to movement* - e.g. increased heart rate, increased blood flow, brain becomes activated, mood improves.

9:15 – 9:45 (30min)	Direct Instruction Phonics
9:45 – 10:00 (15min)	Catch up, pack up, set up and brain break
10:00-10:30 (30min)	LLLL (handwriting, chitter chant cards, worksheets, reading group) Small Group Reading
10:30 – 10:40	Eating Time
11:10-12:00 (50min)	Maths
12:00 – 12:10 (10min)	Brain Break
12:10 – 12:40 (30 min)	English (Reading, Writing, Spelling)
12:40 – 1:05	Eating

ENGLISH - DIRECT INSTRUCTION OF PHONICS

Skill 1: Segmenting

The ability to pull apart the individual sounds in words

pig /p/ /i/ /g/

Skill 2: Blending

The ability to push sounds together to build words

/k/ /a/ /t/ cat

Skill 3: Phoneme Manipulation

The ability to insert sounds into and delete sounds out of words.

Say cat (cat) now say cat without the c (at) Say cat, (cat) change first sound to m you have (mat)

ENGLISH – READING

Little Learners Love Literacy focuses on 'phonemic awareness and alphabet knowledge' giving children the skills they need to read, spell and write with confidence. This sequential program has 7 stages and it is developed from evidence-based literacy research.


The program gives students the skills to actually read (blending) what is on the page.





ENGLISH – READING

Children start reading home-reading books once they have learnt the first 8 phonemes (sounds) introduced in the storybook *Milo's Birthday Surprise*.








HOME READING

- To start later in term 1 after students
 have learnt the first stage of phonemes
 (sounds) and settled into school-life.
- Each stage of learning at school supports the next stage of homereading.





ENGLISH - WRITING



- Little Learners Love Literacy program linked to phonemes (sounds)
- Direct Instruction (phonics/spelling)
- Handwriting (correct pencil grip, letter formation)
- A range of genres throughout the year

During term 1 we will focus on:

- Data Collection





HOW YOU CAN SUPPORT YOUR CHILD

In prep your child should:

- Pack and unpack their own bags and lunchboxes
- Read or be read to at home every night
- Be responsible for their own belongings and clothing
- Be at school on time

O Compass

- Used to communicate whole school and year level specific information
- Enables parents/carers to log student absences
- Provides opportunity for parents/carers to communicate with their child's teacher
- Schedule and view parent/teacher interview appointments
- Provides access to student reports

Two Compass kiosks are available for signing students in or out of school during the day, one at the front office on Brooke St and another in the WEB on Clarke St. No students are to access the kiosks.
