Principal News – May 2023

Musical 24 & 25 August

As mentioned in the March Principal News, we have a new staffing arrangement in our music program which has impacted the way we can run the school musical. We have looked at many alternative arrangements and are pleased to inform families that we will be able to run our school musical at Darebin Arts and Entertainment Centre on 23 and 24 August. Bullying

We have a zero tolerance of bullying. The Department of Education defines bullying as "repeated verbal, physical, social or psychological aggressive behaviour by a person or group directed towards a less powerful person or group that is intended to cause harm, distress or fear". Some specific types of bullying behaviour are:

- Verbal and/or written abuse (including targeted name calling)
- Violence
- Sexual harassment (e.g., conduct of a sexual nature which causes offence and humiliation)
- Homophobia (words and/or hostile behaviour towards students relating to their sexuality)
- Discrimination (including racial discrimination)
- Cyberbullying either online or via mobile phone or device.

There are some behaviours, which, although unpleasant or distressing, are not bullying:

Mutual conflict

- Single-episode acts of nastiness or physical aggression (or aggression directed towards many people)
- Social rejection/dislike (unless it involves deliberate and repeated attempts to cause distress or exclusion).

Social skills and behaviours

Schools are places children come to learn to be literate and numerate. It is also a place they learn to be social. Social skills particularly in the early years of schooling are equally as important as academic learning. While schools don't test these skills, the other students are constantly assessing their peer's social abilities. Communication is essential to enable students to be socially capable. What is essential for us to understand is that each individual child is on a developmental continuum with their social development. Some are more advanced than others and it is important that when there is a gap between your child's social development and others in our school, we need to help each child manage these differences. If your child is experiencing social difficulties, they may require your help to develop these skills through modelling, role-playing, rehearsal, and practice. They may need help with greetings, initiating conversations, understanding the listener, empathising, reading social cues, problem-solving and apologising. They need praise when successfully using a new skill. If parental support isn't making a difference, it might be time to consider seeking assistance from a professional. They can provide structured and tailored programs to meet your child's individual needs. For parents of those who are more socially able, it is essential that we recognise that not all children develop at the same rate and that we need to be empathetic to them and their families particularly when you have concerns. A parent's response to an incident can determine their child's response. This can impact on your child's ability to develop resilience and empathy for others. As parents you can support your child by modelling empathy and acceptance of difference which will promote resilience, kindness and problem-solving skills thus making them more socially capable.

One area of social development we would like your help with is the concept of 'dobbing'. Our students have a tendency to criticise each other if they inform a teacher about the behaviour of others. They can be called dobbers, tattle talers, or told that 'snitches get stitches'. These unhelpful comments reduce the powers of others to seek help. We are trying to frame the wording to be 'ask the teacher for help', to resolve issues in the playground as well as classrooms. If your child tells you they can't tell the teacher, please remind them that asking the teacher for help is an effective way to make a positive change. We can't do something if we don't know about it. We help students to have restorative conversations so that relationships can be repaired and that students can feel safe at school.

Education sub-committee TONIGHT - May 2, 7pm WebEx

The education sub-committee of school council meets at least once per term to discuss education topics and get feedback from parents. The recent forum, as part of the school review, provided us with feedback about the opportunities for parents to provide constructive feedback and a voice. We have decided to trial a new way of running the education sub-committee in term two and if it meets the needs of the community, we will keep it going. Our intention is to choose a topic that we would like some parent voice and constructive feedback about and open the meetings to the parent body to provide that feedback.

Our first meeting on May 2 at 7pm via WebEx, will be on the topic of Bullying. We invite parents/carers to share their hopes/suggestions/concerns/positive feedback on bullying at Westgarth PS. 

Building Project Update

On Monday 24th April, I shared an update on the \$12.97 million Capital Works Project for Clarke St on Compass. This project is going to provide the school with a full competition sized gym, four new classrooms, an under croft and removal of the three front portables. Our school site has many limitations so locating the buildings presented many challenges and considering that with the current costs of building we are very happy with the design. We have been working closely with the Victorian Schools Building Authority and architects from LAW Architects to maximise the outcome. The works are scheduled to begin in August, starting with the removal of portables and site set up. Therefore, we will start the process of decanting and relocating throughout this term. The classes and programs run in these classrooms will be moving. We will keep you updated as further information becomes available.
